This morning's Scripture lessons speak to how God calls people for God's work and mission, even those who believe they are unworthy of such a calling. Isaiah envisions God in holiness and splendor, high and lifted up, surrounded by angels. Seeing the holiness of the Lord in this way, prompts Isaiah to cry out, "Woe is me! For I am a man of unclean lips... yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!" Similarly in Luke's Gospel, after seeing his shocking catch of fish, Simon responds to Jesus saying, "Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!" In both stories, the Lord invites Isaiah and Simon to participate in doing God's work.
