

The scripture lessons today are characterized by pivotal encounters with God. The conversion of Paul in Acts is one of the more dramatic accounts in Scripture about the power of God to transform lives—the foremost persecutor of the early church becomes its leading champion. John's gospel describes Jesus giving Peter the opportunity to reaffirm his love for Christ. After Peter declares his commitment, Jesus charges Peter to "Feed my sheep." This command reveals the good news of Christ's resurrected life—a life devoted to the care and service of others.

Dr. Susan Eastman. Dr. Eastman is an associate research professor of New Testament at Duke Divinity School. Ordained in the Episcopal Church, she served parishes in New York City, Alaska, Oregon, and Pennsylvania prior to coming to Duke. Her current research explores the formation and transformation of identity in the letters of Paul, in conversation with current work issues of human flourishing in science, psychology, and medical ethics. Her current projects include the commentary on Romans for the *New Interpretation Commentary Series*, and a book on reimagining the care of persons in light of Paul's theological anthropology.
