Our scripture lessons today emphasize the importance of fidelity to the Lord's callings and commands. In the first lesson from the book of Ezekiel, God tells Ezekiel to prophesy through a sign-act by which he would demonstrate that God's people would be forced into exile. In the second lesson, God commands Ezekiel to speak against the prophets of Israel who claim to give voice to the commands of the Lord. Because Israel's prophets proclaimed falsehoods and lies, God says God will judged them and turn against them for their evil ways. While God Ezekiel reminds us that God is serious about obedience, Jesus declares that the yoke of obedience and the burden of faithfulness is are easy and light. LITURGY MODIFICATION | From its founding, Duke Chapel has been an interdenominational place of worship. In an effort to engage and reflect the diversity and breadth of our ecumenical Christian practice in worship, we will include the Gospel procession only during specific seasons of the liturgical year. This practice will be included during the seasons of Advent and Christmas and then again in Lent through Easter Day. During these seasons, the Gospel procession will highlight the centrality of Christ's story, appropriate to these distinct seasons. The opening and closing processionals of the cross, candles, scripture, choir, and ministers will continue as a regular practice. All of our worship centers on Jesus Christ, and it is Christ who is greater than any one liturgical practice. May all of our worship give glory to God alone.

DEAN POWERY'S SABBATICAL SPRING 2020 | Chapel Dean Luke Powery will take a sabbatical leave from January 1 to June 30, 2020. During his sabbatical he will be a visiting associate professor in the Department of Africa, African American, and Diaspora Studies in the College of Arts and Sciences at UNC-Chapel Hill as he does research for a book on the Spirit, race, and the church. While he is on leave, the Rev. Bruce Puckett, the Chapel's assistant dean, and Amanda Hughes, the Chapel's director of development and strategy, will assume day-to-day leadership of the Chapel.

CHAPEL BUILDING RESUMES REGULAR HOURS | The Chapel building has resumed regular daily open hours of 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., now that summer maintenance projects inside the Chapel have been completed. SUMMER SCRIPTURE LESSONS | Throughout the summer, we will read the book of Ezekiel as our primary scripture lessons in our Sunday services, and we invite you to read Ezekiel with us outside of our Sunday services. Reading through the book together will allow our community to learn from scripture passages that we do not regularly encounter through the lectionary in our worship services and will open us to receive from a broader range of the scriptural canon; this approach is called *lectio continua*. We hope you will join us through the summer as we read, study, and learn from the book of Ezekiel. The reading for July 14 is 16:1-19:14 and for July 21 is 20:1-24:27.
